

## Bulk Journal Reading with Transcript Instructions

### How to record your reading activities using the bulk journal reading option:

If you are keeping track of **several** articles or topics read throughout the calendar year, you may complete the attached *Bulk Journal Reading Transcript*. (**Note:** This is an Adobe PDF fillable form. To use it, you will need to open it in Adobe Reader software, which can be obtained on Adobe's website free of charge. Please save the blank form to your desktop before you fill it out, and then resave your completed form before you submit it.)

This form allows you to provide the mandatory information for each article read, including:

1. title of each article
2. impact to practice for each one
3. date it was read

You can then submit your accumulated reading as **one** entry in your MAINPORT ePortfolio (<http://mainport.royalcollege.ca>).

Report the total number of articles read under **Section 2: Bulk journal reading with transcript**. Once you submit this activity, you will be prompted to send the supporting documentation as shown in the sample below. The completed "*Bulk Journal Reading Transcript*" can be uploaded directly in MAINPORT ePortfolio on the "Supporting Document" screen, faxed to our office at 613-730-2410, or emailed to [validation@royalcollege.ca](mailto:validation@royalcollege.ca).
